#### Origin of the Easter Bunny and Eggs

Legend has it, every year on Easter, a long-eared, cotton -tailed bunny hops from house to house to deliver festive baskets full of treats, and even leaves colorful eggs hidden for the children to find.

Depending on who you ask, there are various origins of the Easter Bunny.

Some say the Easter bunny first arrived in America in the 1700's with German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania, and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase" or "Oschter Haws." The children would make nests in which this creature could lay its colorful eggs.

Other theories state the symbol of the rabbit stems from ancient pagan traditions that many other Easter traditions are based upon. The Festival of Eostre, honored the goddess of fertility and spring, and the animal symbol for the goddess was a rabbit.

It seems like a case of mistaken biology for a mammal, like a rabbit, to lay eggs, but the answer for the eggs may lie in iconography. Eggs, just like rabbits, have been considered symbols of fertility, rebirth and new life.

From a Christian perspective, Easter eggs represent Jesus' resurrection and his emergence from the tomb. And the tradition of decorating eggs for Easter may date back to the 13th century, when eggs were considered forbidden food to eat during Lent. People would decorate the eggs as the fasting period came to an end, to make eating them more fun on Easter Sunday.

Bertrice Small . . . .

Bertrice Williams Small was born in Manhattan, NY in 1937 and died in 2015. She attended Catholic school. She lived on Eastern Long Island during most of her writing career, which actually began at age forty, when her first novel was published. During her career, she wrote more than fifty risqué historical romances and won many writers awards. She is credited with transforming the romance novel from tame and sexless to fiery and sensual. You might call her style somewhere between "Passionate Romance" and "Sophisticated Smut." Small was a serious writer, spending every day from 10 am until 7 pm writing. She made no apologies for her work, suggesting that if her novels had been written by a man, they would not be criticized.

The novel I read for this review is *Skye O'Malley*, the first in the O'Malley series. The novel is in three parts and 473 pages long (over 1000 in large type face). If you don't like the "f" word, don't read this book. If you don't like lengthy descriptions of people having intercourse, skip this book. If you like stories that are carefully researched, this one is not.

This book is actually three books, each taking place in a different locale. The main character is the same throughout.

Book 1: Ireland. Skye O'Malley has grown up in Ireland and is beautiful, intelligent and perfect in every way. Her father gives her in marriage to a guy she has hated since childhood. The boy's family is wealthy. Skye is fifteen and headstrong and independent. Her father, who is a seaman, has taken her on voyages and taught her about the sea and ships. When her father dies, Skye takes over his ships and his merchant business. At the end of book one, Skye is on one of her ships and is captured by pirates.

Book 2: Algiers. The pirates sell Skye to a man who runs high class brothels in Algiers. These brothels workers provide a service to wealthy and titled men in Algiers. Skye is cleaned up and taught how to behave like a lady, but she has lost her memory of her past. She only remembers her name and the six languages she speaks. The man who owns all the brothels in Algiers falls in love with Skye and asks her to marry him. She does, and eventually takes over doing the bookwork for the brothel business. Her husband is accidentally killed by his former favorite whore, and Skye goes to England to escape a man who wants her for himself.

Book 3: England. Skye meets Elizabeth Tudor, has a baby, gets assaulted by the queen's boy toy, meets an old boyfriend from Ireland, remarries and lives happily ever after, because she is beautiful in every way and talented and very smart and very good at intercourse.

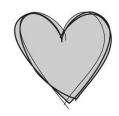
