## **FUN FACTS ABOUT JULY 4TH**

The foundation of 4th of July celebrations lies in one of history's most important documents. The Declaration of Independence didn't just announce America's break from Britain—it established principles that would influence democratic movements worldwide.

- 1. The Declaration of Independence was actually approved on July 2nd, 1776. The Continental Congress voted for independence two days before the famous date, leading John Adams to predict that July 2nd would be celebrated with parades and festivities.
- 2. Only two people signed the Declaration on July 4th, 1776. Despite popular belief, most delegates didn't sign until August 2nd, 1776, when the official parchment copy was ready.
- 3. The Liberty Bell didn't ring on July 4th, 1776. The famous story of the Liberty Bell ringing to announce independence is a myth—the bell was actually cracked and couldn't ring at that time.

### **Revolutionary History and Early Celebrations**

The early years of Independence Day celebrations reveal how Americans began shaping their national identity through commemoration and tradition.

- 1. The first 4th of July celebration happened in 1777 in Philadelphia. The city marked the first anniversary with a thirteen-gun salute, festivities, and fireworks, establishing traditions that continue today.
- 2. Thomas Jefferson and John Adams both died on July 4th, 1826. Remarkably, both founding fathers passed away on the exact 50th anniversary of the Declaration's adoption, just hours apart.
- 3. Calvin Coolidge was born on July 4th, 1872. The 30th President of the United States shares his birthday with the nation, making him the only president born on Independence Day.
- 4. The first public reading of the Declaration happened in Philadelphia. Colonel John Nixon read the document aloud in Independence Square on July 8th, 1776, to a crowd of colonists.

#### **Patriotic Traditions**

- 1. "The Star-Spangled Banner" was written during the War of 1812, not the Revolution. Francis Scott Key penned the national anthem in 1814 after witnessing the British bombardment of Fort McHenry.
- 2. The Pledge of Allegiance wasn't written until 1892. Francis Bellamy created the pledge for the 400th anniversary of Columbus's arrival in America, and it became associated with patriotic holidays like Independence Day.

## **Summer Safety Tips for Seniors**

This can cause issues in the summer because when the outside temperature rises, so does the body's internal temperature. Which is why seniors suffer from heat stroke in the summer more often than younger people.


Therefore, seniors have health risks that need to be monitored, especially in the heat of summer. Below are tips to keep safe and healthy in the rising temperatures of the summer month:

- Stay hydrated
- Stay indoors during extreme heat
- Stay in an air-conditioned place
- Know the weather forecast and dress appropriately
- Protect your skin and eyes
- Know the side effects of your prescriptions. Some medications can cause increased sensitivity to the sun. Look over your medications and talk with your doctor about any concerns or questions you have.
- Know the early signs of heat-related illnesses such as dehydration, heat stroke, heat exhaustion, hyperthermia, etc. Signs to look for may include disorientation, dry skin, excessive tiredness, headache, lethargy, nausea, a flushed face, high body temperature, rapid pulse, dizziness and confusion.




The Art Thief by Michael Finkel



# FRANCIS GARY POWERS, THE U-2 INCIDENT, AND A CONTROVERSIAL COLD WAR LEGACY

#### FRANCIS GARY POWERS JR. AND KEITH DUNNAVANT

Based on newly available information, the son of famed U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers presents the facts and dispels misinformation about the Cold War espionage program that his father was part of, and was featured in Steven Spielberg's Bridge of Spies.



One of the most talked-about events of the Cold War was the downing of the American U-2 spy plane piloted by Francis Gary Powers over the Soviet Union on May 1, 1960. The event was recently depicted in the Steven Spielberg movie *Bridge of Spies*. Powers was captured by the KGB, subjected to a televised show trial, and imprisoned, all of which created an international incident. Soviet authorities eventually released him in exchange for captured Soviet spy Rudolf Abel. On his return to the United States, Powers was exonerated of any wrongdoing while imprisoned in Russia, yet a cloud of controversy lingered until his untimely death in 1977.

Now his son, Francis Gary Powers Jr., has written this new account of his father's life based on personal files that have never been previously available. Delving into old audio tapes, the transcript of his father's debriefing by the CIA, other recently declassified documents about the U-2 program, and interviews with his contemporaries, Powers sets the record straight. The result is a fascinating piece of Cold War history.

Almost sixty years after the event, this will be the definitive account of a famous Cold War incident, one proving that Francis Gary Powers acted honorably through a trying ordeal in service to his country.

Francis Gary Powers Jr. is the founder and chairman emeritus of The Cold War Museum, a 501(c) (3) charity in Vint Hill, Virginia, near Washington, DC. As chairman of the Presidential Advisory Committee for the Cold War Theme Study, he works with the National Park Service and leading Cold War experts to identify historic Cold War sites for commemorating, interpreting, and preservation. He served as a consultant to Steven Spielberg's Cold War thriller, Bridge of Spies. He lectures internationally and appears regularly on the History, Discovery, and A&E Channels.

**Keith Dunnavant** is the author of seven books, including definitive biographies of Joe Montana, Bart Starr, and Paul "Bear" Bryant. The founder of Solovox Publishing and a former editor of *Adweek* magazine's *Special Report*, Dunnavant has led award-winning editorial teams covering media, sports, lifestyle, and politics, directed the civil rights documentary *Three Days at Foster*, and covered college football for *The National*. He has been a featured historian on ESPN, CBS, HBO, and Showtime.
