Memorial Day

Memorial Day is a United States federal holiday observed on the last Monday of May. Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in military service for the US. There is some dispute to the origin of the first observed Decoration Day. Some believe late May was chosen as the date for this holiday because the flowers used to decorate graves would be in full bloom in both Northern and Southern states. Others state the first Decoration Day date was chosen because it didn't coincide with the anniversary of any battles. The first Decoration Day was observed on May 5, 1868. The day involved placing flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. Since the late 1950's, on the Thursday before Memorial Day, 1,200 soldiers from the 3rd U.S. Infantry place small American flags at each of the more than 260,000 gravestones at Arlington National Cemetery. They then patrol 24 hours a day during the weekend to make sure each flag remains standing.

Beginning in 1998, on the Saturday before Memorial Day, the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts place a candle at each of the 15,300 grave sites of soldiers buried at Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park.

In 2000, the National Moment of Remembrance Act defined 3:00 PM (local time) on Memorial Day as the National Moment of Remembrance. Numerous organizations honor this time: such as Major League Baseball games pause, Amtrak trains blast their whistles, and hundreds of other participants suspend their activities in remembrance.

Every year, the president requests all governors to fly their flags at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day.

Gone, but not forgotten.

Here's To Your Good Health!

May is American Stroke Awareness Month. A stroke occurs when a blood vessel in the brain ruptures or bleeds, or when there is a blockage of the blood supply to the brain. Without the oxygen from your blood, brain cells and tissue become damaged and begin to die within minutes.

It is important to know the signs of a stroke. A stroke requires immediate medical attention because prompt treatment is key to preventing further physical damage to your body.

Stroke symptoms can include:

- Paralysis
- Numbness or weakness in the arm, face and leg on one side of the body
- Trouble speaking or understanding
- Slurred speech
- Confusion, disorientation, or lack of responsiveness
- Sudden behavior changes, especially increased agitation
- Vision problems
- Trouble walking
- Loss of balance or coordination
- Dizziness
- Severe sudden headache without a known cause
- Seizures
- Nausea or vomiting

It is better to be overly cautious when dealing with a stroke. If you think someone maybe experiencing a stroke, don't be afraid to seek medical attention immediately.

Janet Evanovich

Janet Evanovich was born in 1943 in South River, New Jersey. She was very artistic growing up and majored in art as a day student at a local community college. She realized that she could never make a living painting pictures and got married and became a "stay-at-home" mom. She had two children, baked bread and took the mom job seriously.

As her children grew older and more independent, she began to write. She started out writing romance novels and collected rejection letters from publishers for ten years. She was very discouraged and thought she would quit writing, but her family urged her to keep writing.

About this time she decided she would do better with mysteries and crime stories. She invented a young woman who went to college but couldn't find a job, got married then divorced, finally accepted a job in her cousin Vinnie's bail bonds business. Thus, Stephanie Plum was born. Evanovich sold her first Stephanie Plum novel for \$2,000. Stephanie was a girl everyone could relate to. If anything could go wrong, it did. There are two men in her life. Joe Morelli is a cop in Trenton, N.J. where all the novels in the Plum series take place. Ranger first appears as an apprehender of people who have missed their court appearance, the job which Stephanie will take over. One other character who is important to this series is Grandma Mazur, Stephanie's maternal grandmother.

I had already read the Evanovich novels in the MAHOVA library, so I downloaded number 27 in the Stephanie Plum series and read *Fortune and Glory*. Grandma Mazur had (in novel 26) married a criminal who died 45 minutes later at the wedding reception. The criminal, whose name was Jim, belonged to a crime group who met weekly in a room behind a bar they owned. Each guy had his own laz-e-boy chair for their meetings. In number 27, when Jim died, the others decided to give his laz-e-boy to Grandma Mazur. The six laz-e-boy criminals had acquired a treasure of some sort and Jim had hidden it because it was too hot to fence. He had made up clues to the treasure's whereabouts and given each laz-e-boy a clue. In addition, Jim had given Grandma Mazur a key while he lay dying, but warned her that there was another key without which the hiding place would blow up if her key was used alone. Stefanie works at solving the mystery while apprehending three bail bond skips with interesting crimes. You must read the book to learn what and where the treasure was.

This book is fun to read as are all of Janet Evanovich's novels. She has written three other series, but I find Stephanie Plum the most entertaining. Evanovich has co-written novels with several other writers including her children. Her son is her business manager and agent and her daughter handles publicity and personal appearances. Janet writes. And that's all she does every day.

Now I need to get on the waiting list for number 28, *Game On*.
