# The History of Halloween in America

Halloween is celebrated each year on October 31. The tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain. People would light bonfires and wear costumes in an attempt to ward off ghosts. Superstitions like avoiding crossing paths with black cats, because they were thought to bring bad luck, find their roots in the Middle Ages. Many believed that witches avoided being found by turning themselves into black cats. Young women believed they could identify their future husband with luck by the next Halloween. Some believed if they ate a sugary concoction of walnuts, hazelnuts and nutmeg before bed on Halloween night they would dream about their future husband. In 18th century Ireland, a cook might bury a ring in mashed potatoes on Halloween night, hoping it would bring true love to the person who found it.

In America, the celebration of Halloween wasn't that popular in colonial New England because of their rigid Protestant beliefs. It was much more common in Maryland and southern colonies. As the beliefs of different European ethnic groups and American Indians began to mesh, a different version of Halloween began to emerge in America. "Play Parties" started, which were public events held to celebrate the harvest; neighbors would share stories of the dead, tell each other's fortunes, dance and sing. Halloween was not celebrated everywhere in America until the second half of the 19th century.

Borrowing from European traditions, Americans began to dress up in costumes and go from house to house asking for food or money, which became today's trick-or-treating. In the late 1800's there was a movement to change Halloween into a holiday more about community and neighborhood get-togethers than about spooky traditions. At this point, Halloween parties became intergenerational and focused on games, food of the season and more festive costumes. Because of this, many of Halloween's superstitious and religious beliefs were lost by the beginning of the twentieth century. By the 1950's Halloween had evolved into a holiday for mainly the young. Trick-or-treating became an inexpensive way for the entire community to share Halloween.

Today, Americans spend an average of six billion dollars annually on Halloween, making it the second largest commercial holiday after Christmas.

### **October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month**

Breast Cancer can affect both women and men. You should check your chest once a month. Can you feel anything new or unusual or does anything look different? Check all parts of your breasts, your armpits and up to your collarbone for changes.

Common signs to look for include:

Lump or swelling in the breast, upper chest or armpit
Changes to the skin, such as puckering or dimpling
Change in color- it may look red or inflamed
A nipple change, for example it has become pulled or inverted
Rash or crusting around the nipple
Unusual discharge
Changes in size or shape
Pain in your breasts or armpit, that does not subside.

# **Book Ends**

John le Carre' .....

David John Moore Cornwell was born in October of 1931 in Poole, Dorset, England. His mother abandoned the family when he was only five. His father spent time with crooks and was jailed for fraud at one point. John's relationship with him was described as "difficult." The family never had enough money.

John went to prep school and was increasingly unhappy with the disciplinary life style. He went on to college and studied foreign languages. In 1950, he was called up for national service and served in the Intelligence Corps. He briefly taught French and German at the college level. Then he joined the M16, the British Intelligence Service.

While in the M16, he wrote his first detective story in 1962. The M16 didn't allow its employees to publish under their real names, so he chose the pseudonym John le Carre'. The French translates as "the square."

In 1963, he wrote *The Spy Who Came In From the Cold* which became an international best seller, allowing him to leave the M16 and become a full time writer.

The le Carre' novel of this review is "Silverview," which was published posthumously in October 2021. Silverview is the name of an estate that is important to the unfolding of the story. The central character, Julian Lawndsley, has left his career in finance in London to open a bookstore in East Anglia. Edward Avon, a Polish immigrant, comes in to chat with him about his shop and to offer suggestions about how to organize it. Julian gets personally involved with Avon and his family. He also learns that Avon is being investigated.

This is a spy story in which everybody seems to be a spy, but the reader has a hard time figuring out who are the good spies and who are the bad spies. I was nearly always confused.

This book doesn't really end, it just stops.
